**ACTION:** Motion by Council member Yeates to approve the minutes of the May 10, 2016 Council Meeting as written. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 7-0.

**MINUTES FOLLOW-UP:** Last Council meeting it was noted that ten municipalities had signed up for hearings on the Water Conservancy District. It is still the same.

**APPOINTMENTS:** There were no appointments.

**OTHER ITEMS:**

- Utah Local Governments Trust Dividend** – Executive Buttars reported there will be a dividend this year and the Trust is expanding services on some coverage the county has.

- **Bear River Mental Health Area Plan FY2017 – Reed Ernstrom** reviewed the plan highlighting Medicaid and the Justice Reinvestment Initiative. Ernstrom expressed appreciation for the county's support. *(The complete Area Plan is on file in the Cache County Clerk's Office.)*

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Potter to approve the Bear River Mental Health Area Plan FY2017. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 7-0.**

**2<sup>nd</sup> CDBG Public Hearing** – Chairman Merrill opened the Public Hearing and Executive Buttars explained that the application of the Cache Senior Citizen Center was recommend for funding of \$89,864.00 to purchase two delivery trucks for the Meals on Wheels program. This hearing is being called to allow citizens to provide input concerning the project which was awarded under the 2016 Community Development Block Grant Program. The Cache Senior Citizen Center application was successful in the regional rating and ranking process. Merrill asked for comments or questions from the audience. There were none.

Executive Buttars remarked that Even Stevens sandwich shop donates money to the Senior Center for every sandwich they sell and have donated \$756.00 thus far.

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to close the 2<sup>nd</sup> CDBG Public Hearing. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 7-0.**

**PUBLIC HEARINGS, APPEALS AND BOARD OF EQUALIZATION MATTERS**

**PUBLIC HEARING: May 24, 2016-5:30 p.m. – Service Area No. 1 Resolution No. 2016-01-Adjustment of Solid Waste Collection and Disposal Fees and Mandatory Curbside Recycling** – Issa Hamud gave a quick update on the North Valley Landfill. Construction has begun and the estimated costs of excavation and road construction were \$2 million and \$6 million, respectively. However, the bids came in at \$1.25 million for the excavation and \$4 million for the road.

Issa Hamud called the Council's attention to the following changes in the fees:

- Temporary container use fees
- Special Events Rate for containers

Chairman Merrill opened the Public Hearing and invited public comment. There was none.

**ACTION: Motion by Council member White to approve Service Area No. 1-Resolution No. 2016-01-Adjustment of Solid Waste Collection and Disposal Fees and Mandatory Curbside Recycling. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 7-0.**

- **Property Tax Relief Requests – 04-062-0170** – Clerk Zollinger indicated the tax notice was sent to the wrong individual for four years.

Council member White wondered how an individual would not think they owe taxes on a property they buy. Council member Zilles concurred that surely by the second year one would realize a tax notice should have been received. *(Details are on file in the office of the Cache County Clerk/Auditor.)*

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Zilles to abate the 2012 property taxes – 04-062-0170. Erickson seconded the motion. The motion passed, 5 aye – Erickson, Merrill, Potter, White & Zilles and 2 nay – Robison & Yeates.**

- **Approval of Restaurant/RAPZ Tax Committee Recommendations** – Chairman Merrill commended the Committee for all of their work. A communication from Director Cameron Jensen indicated there is about \$13,500.00 remaining of RAPZ funds for recreation facilities and \$46,000.00 remaining in the Restaurant Tax which can be used for recreation facilities or for tourism promotion.

Council member Potter reminded the Council of Number 13-Cache County-Development Services-Legal Survey of Upper and Middle Canals for \$13,800.00 – which he believes was accidentally overlooked by the Committee. The Council awarded \$13,500.00 for the project.

**OPENING**

Chairman Merrill read the following:

The proposal for the voters to vote on the creation of the Cache Water District is the subject of a series of public hearings to be held by the Cache County Council and by the legislative body of each participating municipality within Cache County. Following the public hearings, the question of whether the Cache Water District will be created will be placed before the voters during the November, 2016 general election. Owners of private land or registered voters residing within a participating municipality who do not want the proposition to be placed before the voters may file a protest with the clerk or recorder of that municipality and owners of private land or registered voters residing within unincorporated portions of Cache County may file a protest with the Cache County Clerk. All protests must be filed by no later than September 12, 2016, which is 60 days after the last public hearing. If sufficient protests are timely filed, either the election will not be held or the municipality or unincorporated Cache County, for which adequate protests have been timely filed, will be removed from the proposal to create the Cache Water District and from the election. Protests are adequate if filed by the owners of at least 25% of the total private land area and at least 15% of the private land value within the subject municipality or unincorporated Cache County (each of which is an “applicable area”) or by registered voters residing within the applicable area equal in number to at least 25% of the number of votes cast in the area for the office of President of the United States at the most recent election prior to the adoption of the Resolution. If adequate protests are not filed, the election will be held and the voters will decide whether the Cache Water District will be created.

Fotheringham also briefly outlined the process that is being followed.

Chairman Merrill opened the Public Hearing and invited public comment asking for a limitation of three to four minutes for comments germane to the issue.

**INTRODUCTION**

The Local Mental Health Authority submits the following Area Plan for the delivery of mental health services within the District 1 geographical area of Box Elder, Cache, and Rich counties for Fiscal Year 2017, consistent with the statutory expectations under Utah Code Annotated 62A-15-103(2)(e). These services will be provided by contract through Bear River Mental Health Services, Inc. (BRMH), as the sole source provider for the District 1 Local Mental Health Authority.

The Area Plan addresses the continuum of mental health care services as mandated by Utah Code Annotated 17-43-301 and Administrative Rule R523-1-12(c) and takes into consideration the service priorities identified by state contract. Currently, BRMH delivers a comprehensive continuum of mental health services for adults, youth and children, within the scope of existing legislative appropriations and county matching funds, as determined with respect to immediacy of need and severity of illness. These mental health service priorities include, and are consistent with, those services defined as Medicaid Covered services, as well as services mandated relative to the Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health (DSAMH), and subsequent to the statutory and administrative provisions of State and Federal regulation.

In addition, the Area Plan incorporates the forethought of the local authority, in conjunction with the mental health provider, towards the projection of a comprehensive service delivery system within the context of the recovery model of mental health rehabilitation. The following narrative sections contain a description of service delivery, relative to adult and children/youth clients for each service required by statutory mandate, as well as additional non-mandated and supplemental service descriptions applicable to the area population.

Finally, all services delivered within the existing mental health continuum of care will be provided, consistent with a least restrictive philosophy and best practice treatment model as particularly applied to severely and acutely mentally ill children, youth, and adults.






## State Route 30 CORRIDOR STUDY I-15 to 1000 West









# Levels of Service

## for Two-Lane Highways

Level of Service	Flow Conditions	Descriptions
A		Highest quality of service. Free traffic flow with few restrictions on maneuverability or speed.
B		Stable traffic flow. Speed becoming slightly restricted. Low restriction on maneuverability.
C		Stable traffic flow, but less freedom to select speed, change lanes, or pass.
D		Traffic flow becoming unstable. Speeds subject to sudden change. Passing is difficult.
E		Unstable traffic flow. Speeds change quickly and maneuverability is low.
F		Heavily congested traffic. Demand exceeds capacity and speeds vary greatly.



# ORDINANCE NO. 2016-02

CACHE COUNTY, UTAH

## RECORD OF DECISION

ESPLIN ANDERSEN REZONE

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THE REJECTION AND DENIAL OF AN ORDINANCE REQUEST TO AMEND THE COUNTY ZONING MAP

**WHEREAS**, the "County Land Use Development and Management Act," Utah Code Ann. §17-27a-101 *et seq.*, as amended (the "Act"), provides that each county may enact a land use ordinance and a zoning map establishing regulations for land use and development;

**AND WHEREAS**, pursuant to the Act, the County's Planning Commission (the "Planning Commission") shall prepare and recommend to the County's legislative body, following a public hearing, a proposal that represents the Planning Commission's recommendations for zoning the area within the county;

**AND WHEREAS**, the act also provides certain procedures for the county's legislative body to adopt or amend the land use ordinance and zoning map for the county, and;

**AND WHEREAS**, on 03 March 2016 at 5:40 P.M. the Planning Commission held a public hearing for a request to rezone parcel 04-013-0001, 5 acres of property, from the Agricultural (A-10) Zone to the Commercial (C) Zone, which meeting was preceded by all required legal notice and at which time all interested parties were given the opportunity to provide written or oral comment concerning the proposed rezone, and at which meeting a recommendation of denial (5-0) was provided to the County Council for final action;

**AND WHEREAS**, on 12 April at 5:30 P.M., the County Council held a public hearing to consider any comments regarding the proposed rezone, which meeting was preceded by all required legal notice and at which time all interested parties were given the opportunity to provide written or oral comment concerning the proposed rezone. The County Council accepted all comments;

**AND WHEREAS**, after careful consideration of the recommendation of the Planning Commission, comments at the Council's public hearing and other public meetings where such proposed rezone was discussed, and the information provided by county staff, the Council has determined that it is not in the best interest of the citizens of Cache County to approve said rezone;

**NOW THEREFORE**, the County Legislative Body of Cache County ordains as follows:

1. Statutory Authority.

The statutory authority for acting on this ordinance is Utah Code Annotated Sections 17-27a, Part 1 and Part 5, and Section 17-53, Part 2 (1953, as amended to date)

2. Rejection and Denial of Rezone.

The County Council hereby rejects and denies Ordinance 2016-02, the rezone of parcel 04-013-0001, a 5 acre property currently zoned as the Agricultural (A10) Zone, to the Commercial (C) Zone.

3. Findings:

a. The subject property is not appropriately served by public services.

i. The subject property does not have adequate road access for commercial development as neither 4600 North nor 400 West meet the requirement of 22 feet of paved width with 1 foot wide gravel shoulders.


ii. If 400 West were improved to meet the minimum county road standard, the expansion of services for a paved road from a gravel road is not allowed as per Resolution 2015-20. An exception to this resolution is unlikely to be made as it would not improve the health and/or safety of existing legal subdivisions, homes, or businesses.

- iii. The subject property is within Smithfield City's annexation area. Smithfield City has requested denial based on a lack of both utility services and water for fire protection and has stated they shall not extend services until the subject property is annexed into the city.
- b. The subject property is not currently in a compatible location for commercial activities.
  - i. None of the adjacent properties are zoned Commercial. The only properties zoned Commercial in the vicinity are undeveloped parcels approximately ¼ of a mile away along the Highway 91 corridor that would likely require annexation to provide the needed public services.


